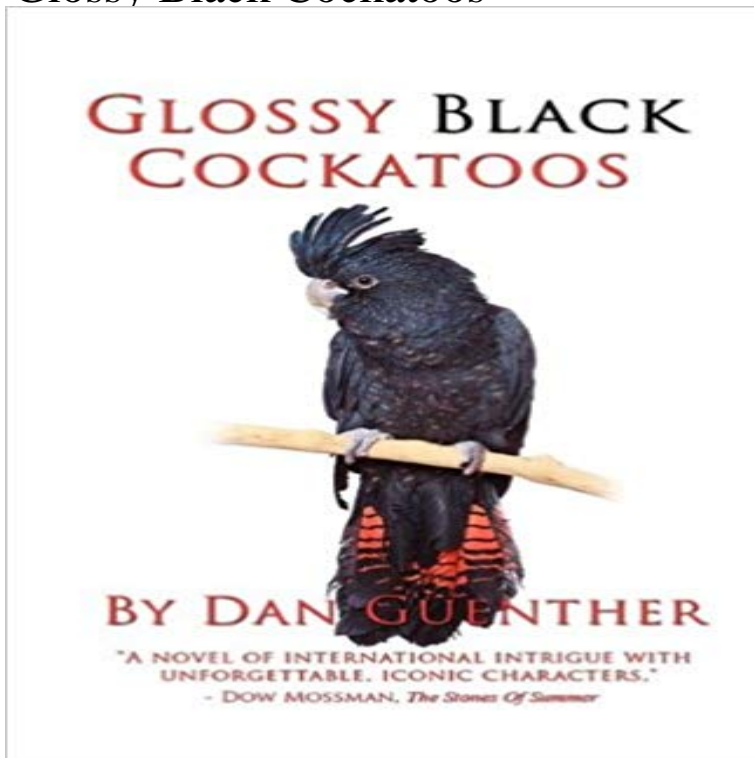


## Glossy Black Cockatoos
